A little bit of advice !.

If you're planning your wedding, it would be absolutely great if you can have a wedding consultant on hand, but if you haven't, that doesn't mean you have to be in a flap and not organized. Make a notebook with dividers, zipper pockets, and loose-leaf paper. Keep every scrap of paper, little notes, fabric swatches, and business cards from every place you visit or buy from.

Also another little tip is to read, read and read. In the beginning it's a great idea to read all those bridal magazines, make notes about what you like and hope to have, tear out pictures of any dresses you like, bouquets, cake decorations, anything, and slip them into your notebook. You can also easily get a list of everything you're likely to need for making your wedding a success, from one of these books or magazines - make use of these lists even if some small part of the list doesn't really apply to your wedding.

If you have a list, you won't be running around on your big day trying to do last minute things you've forgotten. The lists are written by people who have been there and done that, so take advantage of their experience. Don't reinvent the wheel, so to speak.

The next little tip is "know when to quit". Once you know what you like, stop reading and buying those magazines. Stick to what you've collected in your notebook, because by this time you should've collected all the photos and information, fabric swatches, business cards, etc that is what you want for your wedding. Any more research will only be wasting your valuable time and will in all likelihood confuse your judgment and frustrate you.
